Fifth Canadian Transplant Games

A celebration of the gift of life that highlights the importance of donating human tissues and organs

Québec City, August 11, 2010 – At the time of the fifth Canadian Transplant Games, which will take place in Québec City until August 14, Québec-Transplant and Héma-Québec would like to make the most of this event celebrating the gift of life to remind the public about the importance of indicating their intention to donate organs and human tissues.

More than 200 athletes from across Canada and the United States who are transplant recipients have, in fact, accepted the invitation of the Canadian Transplant Association to take part in this event.

"The performances of transplant athletes celebrate the benefits of transplants and provide tangible proof that donating organs means giving life. The Games provide hope for the more than 3,750 Canadians who are waiting for transplants, including over 1,200 Quebecers," stated Mr. Louis Beaulieu, CEO of Québec-Transplant.

The participants in the games also serve as living examples of the success of donating human organs and tissues, of transplants and the possibility that transplant recipients have of regaining quality of life. "The Canadian Transplant Games are an exemplary opportunity to make the public aware of the cause of organ and tissue donation. They celebrate life and demonstrate that, for those who have the opportunity to receive a transplant, everything is possible," said Dr. Francine Décary, President and Chief Executive Officer of Héma-Québec.

Québec-Transplant and Héma-Québec would like to remind the public about the importance of signing the consent sticker distributed when their health insurance cards are renewed. This awareness raising event is also an ideal opportunity for people to inform their loved ones about their desire to allow life to continue following death by donating organs and tissues.

About Québec-Transplant and Héma-Québec

Québec-Transplant is the official organization, mandated by the Minister of Health and Social Services, to coordinate organ donation in Québec. It is responsible for coordinating and facilitating activities pertaining to the identification of potential donors and the collection and allocation of organs so as to contribute to the ongoing improvement of the quality of the services offered to people who need organ transplants. In addition to its role as a supplier of blood products for Québec, Héma-Québec supplies human tissues for transplant, including skin for grafts, heart valves and musculo-skeletal tissues such as tendons and bones, making them available to Québec hospitals. Under a partnership agreement with Banque d'Yeux du Québec, Héma-Québec also collects eyeballs for use in cornea transplants. APPENDIX

Québec-Transplant

In 2009:

- With an average of more than 3.6 transplanted organs per donor, and more than 430 transplant recipients, Québec sets a new historic record.
- 138 donors deceased.
- 1202 persons waiting for a transplant.

In the last ten years, Québec has been a leader when it comes to the number of donors deceased per million inhabitants:

- 2009 number of donors per million inhabitants (DPMI):
 - o Québec -17.6
 - o Ontario -16.7
- 2008 DPMI:
 - o Québec 19.4
 - o Ontario -13.7
 - o Canada: 14.5

Principal causes of death among organ donors in 2009:

Stroke: 62%

Head trauma: 18%

Anoxia: 16%

Average age of donor:

49 years old (men: 55% / women: 45%)

In 2009, children (0 à 18 ans) accounted for 6.5% of donors.

Average age of persons waiting for a transplant: 51 years old

Average age of transplant recipients: 49 years old

Héma-Québec

The total number of human tissues (other than ocular) has increased by 13% since last year.

Distribution of human tissues to hospitals:

2009-2010: 2,631 2008-2009: 1,966 2007-2008: 876 2006-2007: 364 2005-2006: 243

Types of human tissue: skin tissue, musculoskeletal tissue, heart tissue (heart valve), ocular tissue (corneas).
